FROM YOUR FLOTILLA COMMANDER(elect)



I am honored to have been elected Flotilla Commander for 2011 and will do my best to live up to this responsibility. This is uncharted water for me, and I welcome any advice or suggestions you might have.

With Mike Morgan as Flotilla Vice Commander and the Flotilla Staff Officers in place, I think we have a strong team for 2011. Those of you doing this job for the first time, as I am, will be learning as you go. My advice is to study your job description and do not hesitate to call on others in the flotilla who may have done the job before.

Here are some goals and thoughts for 2011. Some of these came from our members:

- 1. Recruitment: Charlie Smith suggests we try and get 11 new members in 2011--he calls this "11 in 11". Carolyn Strong suggests trying to recruit more women, and when recruiting, explain the benefits of having spouses join together.
- 2. Retain members. A personal lesson here: when I joined the Auxiliary, for several years I did not really get to know anyone--partly my fault as work took up a lot of my time. But, there seemed to be a clique who ran the flotilla and did not seem to be interested getting to know or encourage new members. As a result, I went to fewer and fewer meetings. A few years later, a new bridge took over the flotilla. These new folks learned my name, found out I was interested in boating. I made friends and got more engaged, eventually getting crew and then coxswain qualified with the help of my new friends. The point here is to be proactive in getting to know our members, find out their interests, give them a job to do or let them tag along with you. Give people an opportunity to get involved.
- 3. Have more social or fellowship activities--this should impact retention of members. This idea is from Carolyn and Bob Strong. Bob wrote that he believes fellowship is the glue that holds the flotilla together.
- 4. FSO mentoring: FSOs should try to mentor or have an understudy learning their job and who can take over in the future. I encourage each FSO to identify this person or persons.
- 5. Chain of leadership: The idea is for members to report to FSOs, FSOs report to VFC, VFC reports to FC. This allows delegation of responsibility and one person is not burdened with all flotilla matters, trivial and important. As much as we can, we should follow this guideline. However, I would not want strict adherence to this to interfere with communications in our flotilla. Since we have a fairly small number of active members, I think we should encourage open communications amongst all in the flotilla. Many problems can be averted or remedied by proactive honest, open, and respectful communication. Mike or I should be available at most times by either e mail or cell. On that note, check e mails--as in the past, this is how we will continue to do much of the flotilla's communication.
- 6. Operations: We have four members currently interested in operations and have been on patrols as trainees. I would like to see all complete this crew training process and become qualified as crew this year. Cris Vonderheide has been on quite a few QE missions and is an excellent source of information on what the QE's are like.
- 7. Have more speakers at meetings (idea from Carolyn Strong). In the same vein, try and have some type of training at most meetings.
- 8. FSOs individually set goals. Since I have mainly been in operations and am not very familiar with many of the other areas, think about what you would like to accomplish in your area.
- 9. Treat all with respect and integrity. We are all volunteers. There are no bosses or underlings. Along this same line, respect the time of others--someone else's time is as valuable as yours.
- 10. Have fun. Remember, this is your ride (as the message on the spinner at the YMCA tells me).

OPERATIONS – WHIT VICK

On 12/11/10, a patrol on *Carlie* was done with Cris Vonderheide, Kyle George, and myself. We practiced dead reckoning and ran a sector search pattern in the St Johns River south of Julington Creek. Kyle worked on his radio etiquette, and Cris gave him a lot of information on crew requirements. We do training on all patrols, and our current trainees, Kyle, John Hadley, Marlene and Kevin Koehl, are availing themselves of this opportunity. Book learning is required, but nothing takes the place of on the water training.

With the colder weather, Mustang suits have to be on board for all patrols and worn if indicated by Station Mayport. The rule is for a water temperature of 50-60 degrees F (as measured by station), Mustangs are worn. Below 50 degrees, no patrol unless waiver granted by station.

Welaka training will begin in January, 2011. All Welaka crew and coxswains will be required to have operations excellence certification.

Coxswain training by Mike Owsley and Bob Funk will resume in January.

United States Coast Guard Auxiliary Update For the Love of Boating

To start 2011 I wish to show you how one person can promote boating safety. Our flotilla is honored to have significant impact at the National level, having two past National Commodores and a current member of the Auxiliary's National Staff. Rusty Gardner, is the National Branch Chief of Video Services for Public Affairs, a natural adjunct of his everyday position and his innovations in promoting boating safety. If you meet him, beware, since Rusty's enthusiasm for boating is contagious, even as his story defines the love of boating.

Rusty's day job is the Director of Digital Media Productions for Florida State College Jacksonville. He arrived there partially through a BA in Psychology and a Masters in Religious Education. His confluence with the Auxiliary led to his origination of an idea to promote boating safety with short videos usable on Podcasts and DVDs. To date, he has produced them on Marine radios and life vest use. He has also written emergency radio articles for the Coast Guard Search and Rescue Journal, maintains Facebook boating pages for Jacksonville and St. Augustine and has originated a boating web site. The National Water Safety Congress presented him a regional award for his outstanding contributions to water safety. In his National role, Rusty worked an exercise in March for agencies practicing response to an oil spill. The Gulf Oil Spill happened less than a month later.

In Rusty's own words, he always loved the water and dreamed of the day he would own a boat. While his parents sometimes had a boat as a hobby, it was not a lifestyle. While the timing for his own boat never seemed right, he would gaze at them from the Buckman bridge on his way to work and dream of the day. About 8 years ago he bought the 23' Yamaha jetboat that would become the Salt Shaker. The first thing he did was take the Auxiliary's Boating Safety Course. Being impressed with the instructor's dedication, he signed up and his quest for boating knowledge continued to grow. He became a Vessel Examiner, a Marine Dealer liaison, took seamanship classes and produced the safe boating videos that led to his National Staff position.

Not satisfied, he renewed his basic instinct to be on his boat with a few trips on the St. Johns River that fired his desire to see all of Florida and led to his establishment of Florida by Water.com, a free commercial site that provides a comprehensive directory of boating information about Florida and access to all the sites a boater could want. Each of thousands of locations on the site has to be "boater friendly" and accessible by boat and they are verified as active and pertinent. You can also access a float plan for your trip and other boating safety web sites. It is a friendly and attractive boating tool.

The Auxiliary's membership wishes to meet you and share our experience. Contact Charles Smith at 904-541-1660 and he will guide you through membership. All boat operators can take the Auxiliary Boating Safety Program and its fee is included in our minimal member dues. 



- Tuesday, Jan. 11: Using the JVC GY-HM100U camera. This session will cover the basic concepts, features and techniques for using the JVC camera. We will also be discussing lighting and sound techniques.
- Wednesday, Jan. 12: Introduction to Final Cut Pro. The session will take you through the steps for creating a project in either Final Cut Pro or Final Cut Express. Features will include video capture, file management, transitions, basic editing and basic titles.
- Thursday, Jan. 13: Delivery Methods. This session will cover compression standards and techniques, as well as free tools to enhance the delivery of content through Social Media and DVDs.
